

From Mrs. Hudson's Kitchen



CURRIED FRUIT BAKE

(When Mrs. Hudson wished to curry favor with Mr. Holmes, she would serve this tasty dish as an accompaniment to ham or pork.)

1 small can yellow cling peach slices
1 small can chunk pineapple
1 small can pear halves (cut in half)
1 small can peeled apricot halves
Small jar of maraschino cherries
2 cup butter, melted
2 tsps.curry powder
1/3 cup light brown sugar

Drain fruits and pat dry with paper towels. Place in a baking dish. Melt butter, brown sugar and curry powder, and spoon over fruit. Bake, uncovered, at 350° for 1 hour. Cover and refrigerate overnight. Before serving, reheat casserole, uncovered, at 350° for 30 minutes. Serves 6
