




HE'S EVERYWHERE...

I recently acquired a videotape featuring two episodes from the 1964 animated series, The Famous Adventures of Mister Magoo. In this short lived series, Jim Backus as Quincy Magoo as assorted figures from literature introduced children to some of the world's finest writing by retelling a different story each week in a 30 minute TV show. The tape I acquired contains two episodes, the first one being Sherlock Holmes and the second one Frankenstein. I thought I might just hit a few highlights of the Doyle tale for those that might be interested.

The story, in which Magoo plays the part of Doctor Watson has elements of The Speckled Band and The Six Napoleons and really captures the flavor of the canon very well indeed! You have the requisite damsel in distress at the beginning, one Helen Parkum, who is pursued on the streets of London by not one but two different villains and who opines about (cont. on page 4)

(cont. from page 3)Sherlock "He's the one man in England who can help me." Before ever laving eyes on her. Holmes tells Watson that she is a young lady with an umbrella who has lost the heel to one of her shoes. The Baker Street furnishings include the Persian slipper containing tobacco, correspondence transfixed to the mantelpiece with a jackknife, the Stradivarius, etc. Watson is wondering when he'll ever have time to record some of Holmes's cases such as The Adventure of the Red Leech. The Adventure of the Blue Ink Forgery, and The Adventure of the Three Winged Parrot. An adventure which the good and true Watson does not mention is which animators one the inadvertently authored Adventure of the Now You See It, Now You Don't Pipe. There is one scene in which Holmes is standing in front of the fireplace, his calabash reposing comfortably atop the mantelpiece. As Holmes continues talking, the pipe literally disappears. "No ghosts need apply" indeed! The good doctor also laments that he never gets to wear disguises like Holmes does, to which Sherlock replies "Your face is handsome for disguises, dear Watson."

The young lady, who is living with her cruel stepfather and who is engaged to a sailor by the name of Joseph Tabor, has received a mysterious message pertaining to a gift given to her by her fiance; a gold nugget on a necklace housed in a handsome box, both items having been picked up in Cape Town. Holmes examines the items as well as the cryptic message which says "The star concealed means death". The Great Detective then sends her

home with the assurance that both he and Watson will journey there shortly. After Helen leaves, Holmes shares his fears with Watson, stating that the box was certainly not purchased in Cape Town, as the wood is from Central America, the hinges are made in France, the wax from Brazil. and workmanship is English. On the train journey down, our keen eyed sees two suspicious characters -a grim Sikh and a sailor who is reading a penny dreadful. After investigating at her home,

Holmes has Watson place a coded message in all the papers in order to confirm some suspicions he has. A baffling reply sends our Victorian dynamic duo to the Wax Museum, where Holmes becomes The Bard of Avon while Watson disguises himself as Caesar.





Le Carre' Strikes Again!

In the past we have given several quotes from the novels of John LeCarre' in which the author has made Sherlockian reference. Herewith are a few more:

From Our Game, a novel

I was counting money: bills, letters, cheque stubs. I was reading burned letters from banks.

"Dear Miss Stoner" - the top right corner of the page charred, writer's address incomplete, except for the letters SBANK and the words *des pays. Geneve.* Miss Stoner's address 9A Cambridge Street, Bristol. "We note from the ...losed state...tha...have substan...quid...ts in...ur...urrent acc...Should you ...no immedia... call upon...may wish to...ferring them to..."

Left side and lower half of letter destroyed., Miss Stoner's response unknown. But Miss Stoner is by now no stranger to me. Or to Emma.

"Dear Miss Roylott."

Quite right: Miss Roylott is Miss Stoner's natural companion. It's Christmas evening before the big fire in the drawing room at Honeybrook. Emma wears her intaglio necklace and a long skirt and sits in the Queen Anne wing chair while I read aloud Conan Doyle's "Speckled Band," in which Sherlock Holmes rescues the beautiful Miss Stoner from the murderous designs of Dr. Grimesby Roylott.....

"Dear Miss Watson."

The writer is in Edinburgh and signs himself "Overseas Portfolio Exe..." And Watson should have been braving the wild beasts of Dr. Grimesby Roylott's private zoo with an Eley's N° 2 revolver in his pocket....

"Dear Miss Holmes."

From The Russia House, a novel:

"Now, Barley, what is this total nonsense you are putting about that you have come here in order to buy Soviet books, please?" Zapadny demanded by way of opening courtesies, lifting his hooped eyebrows and placing the tips of his fingers together like Sherlock Holmes.



Pop Goes the Literature

An excerpt from an article in *TIME*, 12/13/2004 by Lev Grossman

In Michael Shabon's new mystery novel, The Final Solution ...

The detective in *(the book)* is almost certainly meant to be our old friend Sherlock Holmes, although Chabon never names him. Chabon's Holmes is long past his Baker Street prime: at 89, he has become a grail, eccentric, beekeeping retiree. Mystery comes looking for the aging detective in the form of a mute boy, 9, and his pet parrot (the symmetry is neat but not too: a boy who can't speak and a bird that can). Before long, the parrot is missing, a man is dead, and Holmes is back in the game.

...Solving mysteries has an existential meaning for Holmes. To him, it's the "essential business of human beings - the discovery of sense and causality amid the false leads, the noise, the trackless brambles of life."
