

If man were not a puzzle there would be no rationale for the detective story. Or for that matter, for getting up in the morning.







RASPBERRY TRIFLE

This delightful (and very caloric)
English dessert was a great favourite of
Mrs. Hudson. It was her piece de resistance
after a succulent fare of roast beef.

2/3 cups day-old cake, crumbled

3/4 cup sherry or sweet white wine

1 quart raspberries

3 tablespoons sugar 1 cup heavy cream 2 cups custard

Quantities for trifle (long i) are always approximate; a little more or less of any ingredient shant matter. Put the cake into the bottom of a deep bowl. Sprinkle the sherry over it and stir well so that all the cake is moistened. Use extra sherry, if necessary, to achieve this. Put half the raspberries in a saucepan with the sugar. Cover & simmer over a low heat for a minute or two 'til the raspberries are juicy. Remove from the heat & stir in half the remaining raspberries, reserving the rest for decoration. Pour the raspberries over the cake. Cover with the custard & allow to cool. Whip the cream & spread it over the trifle. Decorate with the reserved raspberries. Strawberries, ripe peaches or other soft summer fruit may be used instead of raspberries, which are often hard to come by, and when available are sold for a "king's ransom". Frozen raspberries or strawberries, their juice thickened with a tablespoon of cornstarch, are also good substitutes during winter. Enjoy!





The famous Baker Street Irregulars unites the most passionate Sherlock Holmes buffs. Founded in the U.S. by writer Christopher Morley in 1934, it is named after urchins in Holmes's neighborhood who fed him information. Members slyly perpetuate the legend that Sherlock Holmes is not a legend, but lives—

as they point out, no obituary has ever appeared in the London Times. In keeping with Victorian convention, women Sherlockians have a separate organization: the Adventuresses of Sherlock Holmes. Both groups admit members who have made major contributions to Sherlockian affairs. Harold Niver, 47. owner of Sherlock's Music Co. in Hartford. Connecticut, who has assembled a collection of 4,000 items from first editions to pipes carved in Holmes's image, was elected to the Irregulars for founding a local offshoot called a scion. Sherlockians of either sex can join one or more of 184 scions; for information write Peter Blau, 3900 Tunlaw Road N.W., No. 119, Washington, D.C. 20007.

LONDON (AP) - Sherlock Holmes is 100 years old and still gets many requests from real people to solve crimes. The stock reply is: "Mr. Holmes thanks you for your letter. At the moment he is in retirement in Sussex, keeping bees."

Britain will begin a year of international tribute to history's greatest fictional sleuth with a dinner today in the House of

Commons.

"He is still incredibly popular," said Capt. William Michell, secretary of the 800-member Sherlock Holmes Society in Britain. "The Victorian age had its share of crime and unhappiness, but... it was a settled age and people like to be reminded of that. Call it nostalgia or what you like."

At precisely 9:30 p.m., 180 members of the society will raise their glasses in the members' dining room of the Commons in a toast "to the immortal memory of Sher-

lock Holmes."

Students of Holmes have declared Jan. 6 to be the birthday of Sir Arthur Conan Doyle's greatest creation - the point at which the brilliant, sharp-featured detective began his crusade against Dr. Moriarty and other villains with the aid of his friend and foil, Dr. John Watson.

The dinner at the House of Commons is held annually, but Michell said that today "is very special because it's the centenary

year."

Among the guests will be **Dame Jean** Conan Doyle, 73, the only surviving child of Sir Arthur, who died in 1930 at age 71.

On Thursday, the Baker Street Irregulars will toast the sleuth in New York. Japanese Holmesians will have an anniversary party in February. A pageant is scheduled for early May in Switzerland and other events are planned in the United States, Australia and elsewhere.






§ Sherlock Holmes expert honored

Vincent Starrett, who spent his life tracking Sherlock Holmes, rested in an unmarked grave from 1974 until last week when Holmes' fans throughout the nation gathered at Graceland Cemetery in Chicago to honor the famous mystery writer.

"He was just one of those people that everybody liked," said Wilmette Village Attorney Robert Mangler, who helped organize a worldwide drive that allowed Starrett's admirers to purchase a \$6,000 monument for the unmarked grave.

"He was a friend of practically everybody in American literature for 50 years," said Mangler, a diehard member of the "Hounds of the Baskerville" club that Starrett founded in 1943.

Sherlock Holmes fans from across the nation and foreign countries, including Australia, Japan and Denmark, chipped in donations to mark the resting place of Starrett, who was an authority on Arthur Conan Doyle's super sleuth.

"A lot of Sherlockian people

from all over organized a drive to raise funds to properly mark his grave," he said. "We started a fund-raising campaign through book collectors and book devotees around the country, as well as Sherlock Holmes groups around the world. The response tremendous."

Starrett began his career as Chicago newspaperman, working for the Chicago Daily News and the Chicago Tribune before turning his full attention toward his favorite hobby, pursing Sherlock Holmes.
